






We have a total of 54 faculty from all over the world, divided into full and part time **

- Franklin is approved by the Chinese Ministry of Education as an accredited foreign university *



SPECIAL PROGRAMS

3 YEAR DEGREE

This program is ideal for those students who are dedicated learners, have followed an academically rigorous high school curriculum and have their mind set on a specific academic major at the time of their application for admission. This accelerated degree is designed for students with specific high school academic credentials who are admitted to Franklin with advanced standing credit, equivalent to 30 US credits.

THE GLOBAL BA / FRANKLIN-EMERSON **ASSOCIATE DEGREE**

The partnership between Emerson College and Franklin University Switzerland, gives you the opportunity to pursue a Global Bachelor of Arts in International and Political Communication or a Global Bachelor of Arts in Business of Creative Enterprises. By completing one of these programs, you will earn both an associate's degree from Franklin, and a bachelor's degree from Emerson. Students enrolled in these programs will spend two years in Lugano, Switzerland, and two years in Boston, benefitting from the strengths and expertise of both schools.

GAP YEAR PROGRAM

A gap year offers high school graduates the opportunity to explore interests before starting college. It is a semester or year of experiential learning meant to deepen one's practical, professional and personal awareness.

FOUNDATION YEAR

This program is well suited for students who are switching into an English language academic program for the first time and would benefit from stronger support not only in their academic writing, but also in their transition to University. It is also an option for students with inconsistent academic records who would benefit from greater support services in order to have a successful transition to University.

SUMMER PROGRAMS

Franklin's undergraduate summer sessions offer you a rigorous, cross-cultural experience through courses taught in a vibrant, intellectual community. Our program consists of two 4-week intensive sessions that begin in early June and run through the end of July. Several summer Academic Travel programs also give you the opportunity to travel with your professor to a destination linked to an academic topic. Franklin also offers special summer programs for high school students in July. Students can earn university credit and experience campus life.


FRANKLIN CAREER NAVIGATOR



LIVING AT FRANKLIN

Living on campus in one of the eight residences is an integral part of the Franklin experience. It not only enriches your connection to your peers, but it also plays a vital role in your academic involvement.

There are eight residence halls at Franklin, and each one has a trained Resident Assistant. Resident Assistants are part of the Office of Student Life, and work to ensure that your living experience at Franklin is as optimal as possible and that you live in a safe and enriching space.

The University requires all new incoming students who are not residing with their parents or legal guardians to live in a university residence - each semester, about 88% of our students live oncampus.



Swiss Alps. Glacial lakes. Mediterranean climate. Italian flavor. An international population. This is the city we call home: Lugano, Switzerland.
